
Our latest reunion brought us back to the island, long changed from the way it was, but still a place we hold fondly in our memories. We had tremendous help from a number of folks who made it a very

BUSINESS MEETING:



He is survived by his wife, Karin; eight children and many grandchildren and great-grandchildren.
